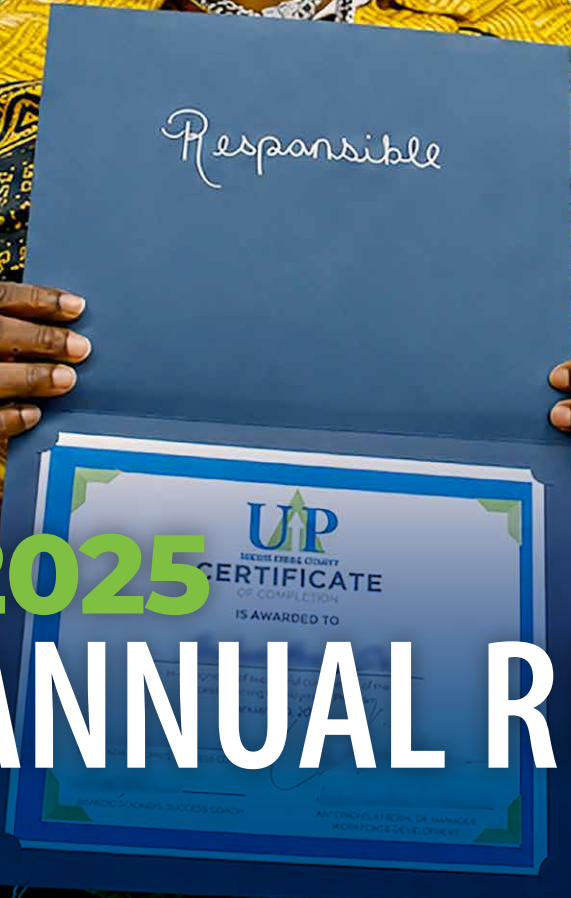

OUR IMPACT

TO OUR CHERISHED SUPPORTERS

“The key to rebuilding communities is individual initiative, leadership and personal responsibility. If we encourage these qualities in our people then our freedoms will not wither and die. President Reagan’s words capture the very heartbeat of our mission at United Against Poverty. Strong communities are not built by charity alone, but by cultivating initiative, restoring dignity, and creating real pathways to opportunity. Every day at the UP Center, we see what is possible when individuals are empowered to rise as far as their talents will take them.

In 2025, that empowerment translated into measurable, life-changing impact. Through our workforce programs, **130 graduates secured employment – each job representing not just a paycheck, but renewed confidence, stability, and hope for the future.**

We continue to work alongside employer partners and community agencies to ensure that individuals facing the steepest barriers are met with opportunity, not obstacles.

At the same time, the need in our community continues to grow.

Our crisis stabilization program served 2,420 households (38% increase over 2024), providing emergency assistance, housing support, and critical resources to families navigating their most difficult moments. When crisis strikes, whether personal or community-wide, the UP Center remains a place where neighbors find both immediate relief and a pathway forward.

Our Member Share Grocery Program (MSGP) continues to be one of the most powerful expressions of dignity-centered service in action. In 2025, 17,121 households utilized the program. Within those households there are more than 14,000 children and 54,425 total individuals. **That means MSGP provided consistent access to low-cost, healthy food and household essentials to 32% of our county’s total population.** This is not simply food distribution; it is a community-powered model that preserves choice, stretches household budgets, and strengthens family stability.

Behind every number is a story. Behind every story is a network - partners, volunteers, donors, and advocates who believe that when we encourage leadership, responsibility, and initiative, communities don’t just survive; they flourish.

Your support does more than sustain programs. It fuels transformation. Together, we are rebuilding lives, strengthening families, and ensuring that opportunity remains within reach for all who are willing to strive for it. Together, we continue to lift our community in the only direction we know: UP!

MEMBER SHARE GROCERY PROGRAM

UNITED AGAINST POVERTY'S MEMBER SHARE GROCERY PROGRAM (MSGP) is an accessible, dignified, worry-free food assistance program where you can personally select food and household products suited toward you and your family's needs.

Membership is free and available to households that fall at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level. Members contribute a small handling fee per item to help offset fuel, freight, warehouse, and overhead costs, which allows the MSGP to be self-sustainable. This meaningful exchange is part of our Hand-Up model that is designed to restore dignity and teach empowerment rather than entitlement.

Offers a wide range of fresh produce, proteins, freezer items, pantry staples and more.

Members can save up to two-thirds on their average grocery and household product budget.

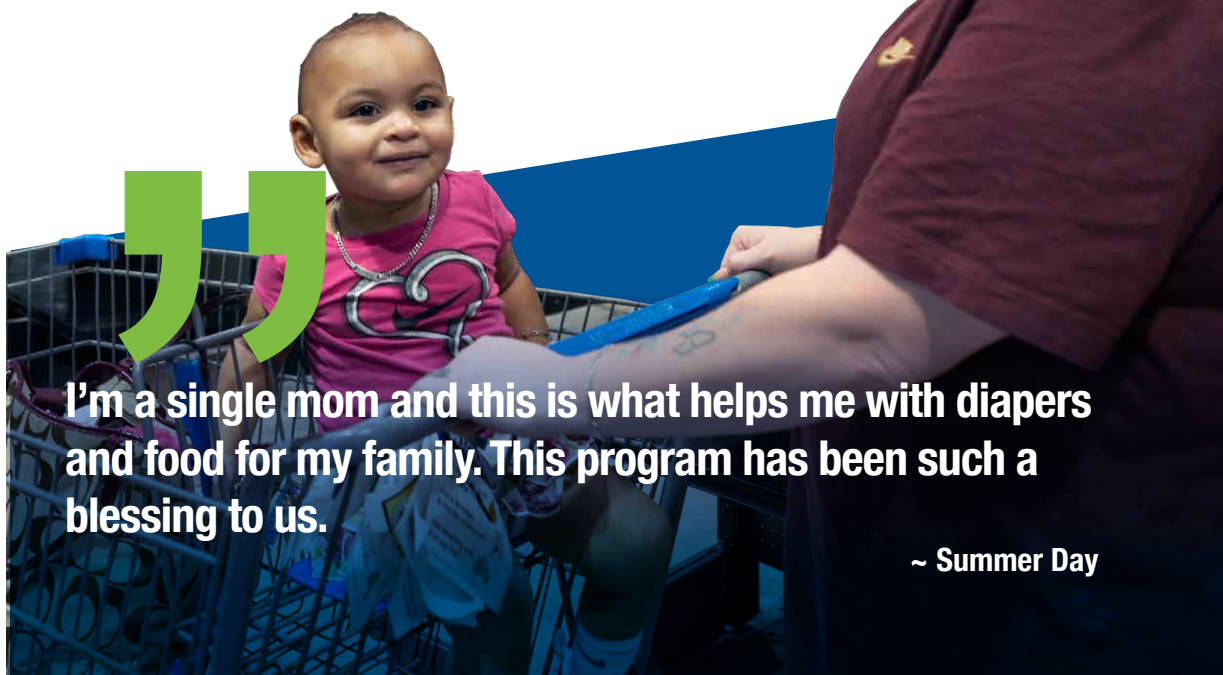

WORKFORCE PROGRAMS



The Success Training Employment Program (STEP) is a three-phase workforce training program designed to help individuals overcome barriers and achieve long-term success.



Build UP is a three-phase program providing hands-on training and skills to secure in-demand, high paying employment in the growing trades, construction and manufacturing fields.

UP'S WORKFORCE PROGRAMS are designed to support adults with true barriers to the world of work and upward mobility. Those include lack of a GED or High School diploma, former incarceration, little to no work experience and challenges associated with homelessness and substance misuse.

What differentiates STEP and Build UP from other workforce programs is the focus we place on growing the emotional intelligence of the adults we serve as well as the 1:1 success coaching that every graduate receives during their first year of employment.

THE COMMUNITY'S HOUSE

Perhaps the greatest value we offer our community is not only the programs we operate, but how we choose to operate the UP Center itself. More than an expansive home for United Against Poverty's services, the UP Center is intentionally designed to be a shared space where partners can gather, collaborate, and expand their impact.

We believe meaningful change happens when organizations work together. Guided by the belief that together we are stronger, the UP Center serves as a hub where collaboration replaces competition, and collective impact becomes possible.

In 2025 alone, **104 nonprofit organizations and 65 employer partners** utilized the UP Center to host programs, trainings, hiring events, and community initiatives that directly benefit our neighbors.

United Against Poverty is more than just our name. It is our philosophy. Through the UP Center, we are proud to offer something truly unique to our region: a place that belongs to everyone working to build a stronger community.



GERSTNER HELPING HANDS

The affordability crisis and housing costs continue to be the biggest barrier in Indian River County, with over 50% of our residents unable to afford basic necessities (housing, childcare, healthcare, transportation, etc.).

To address this challenge, we partner with **Gerstner Philanthropies** to help working individuals and families with up to \$3,000 for first/last/security payments to move into a rental home of their own. These funds help employed adults who are unable to save this heavy move-in cost to leave shelters, hotels and in too many cases, their vehicles or the streets, to have a home of their own for themselves and their children.

In partnership with Gerstner Philanthropies, we administered **\$150,000 in housing support** for working families to afford first/last/security down payment to get into a rental home in 2025. Of the **78 families** we supported, **76 remained in their homes!**

UPSKILL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

We recognize that for adults who graduate from our workforce programs, economic self-sufficiency is not always linear. The dream job often requires additional certifications, or in many cases for those we serve, a GED. UP does not want cost to be the reason why our graduates can't pursue continued professional development. Through generous funders, we launched the UPskill Scholarship

Program, enabling workforce graduates funding and guidance to get enrolled and complete programs such as phlebotomy, CDL certification, Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA), security licenses and GED completion.

In 2025, we supported 25 adult graduates with scholarship funding to help lift themselves and their families to economic freedom.



Bruce came to the STEP program after depleting his savings while searching for employment over the course of eight months, which unfortunately led to several dead ends. His long-term goal is to pursue a career in law enforcement; however, Bruce felt that he lacked the necessary connections and experience to get a fair opportunity in the field.

After conducting some research, Bruce returned to meet with Crisis Services to explore funding options to obtain both his unarmed and armed security licenses. He shared that earning these certifications would help him gain valuable work experience and strengthen his qualifications toward his ultimate goal of becoming a law enforcement officer.

Bruce completed his security training and is happily employed with All Florida Security.

SNAP SUPPORT INITIATIVE: BRIDGING THE GAP

When the SNAP benefit freeze took effect on November 1, hundreds of families in our community were suddenly left without a reliable way to put food on the table. There is a common saying we've adopted at UP during moments of crisis that impact our larger community – **"If not us, who?"**.

In partnership with the **Indian River Community Foundation** and **John's Island Community Service League**, within days we raised the capital and mobilized the SNAP Support Initiative to ensure that no family had to face this crisis alone. Through Member Share Grocery Program vouchers and on-site community partnerships, we were able to provide both immediate relief and meaningful connections to additional support services.

In just 12 days, we helped **372 households**, representing **979 individuals**, including **412 children** and **197 seniors**, continue accessing the food and essentials they depend on. This initiative helped offset more than \$152,000 in frozen SNAP benefits by **providing \$47,330 in grocery support** directly to families when they needed it most.

Over the course of ten days, **257 new families joined the Member Share Grocery Program**, creating a pathway to ongoing stability and access to affordable food long after the crisis passed.

Families didn't just get through a difficult moment. They found support, dignity, and a community that showed up when it mattered most.



In October, when the federal budget standoff affected many critical programs, John's Island Community Service League (JICSL) partnered with the Indian River Community Foundation to fund United Against Poverty's SNAP Support Initiative to subsidize lost SNAP benefits for needy IRC residents. UP developed a very resourceful solution to help our neighbors, and JICSL was all too happy to help!

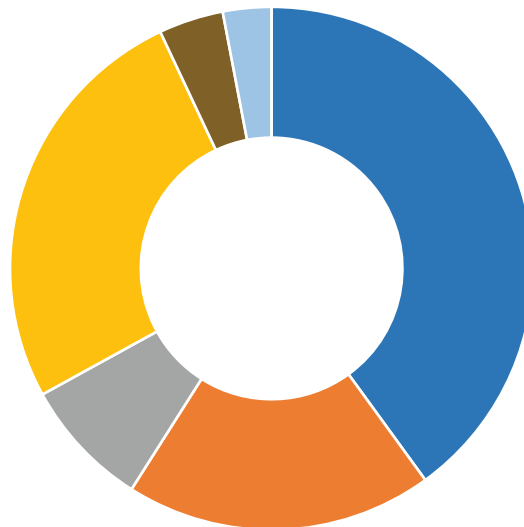

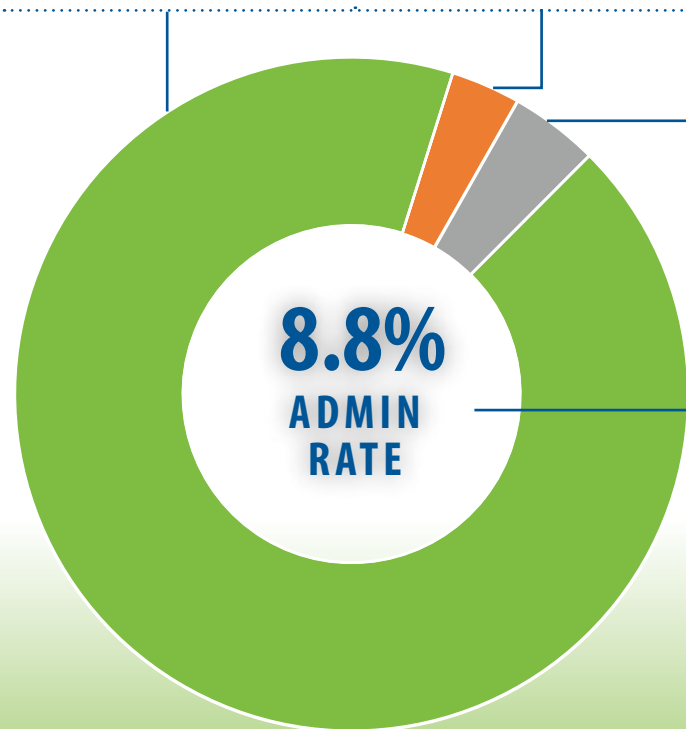

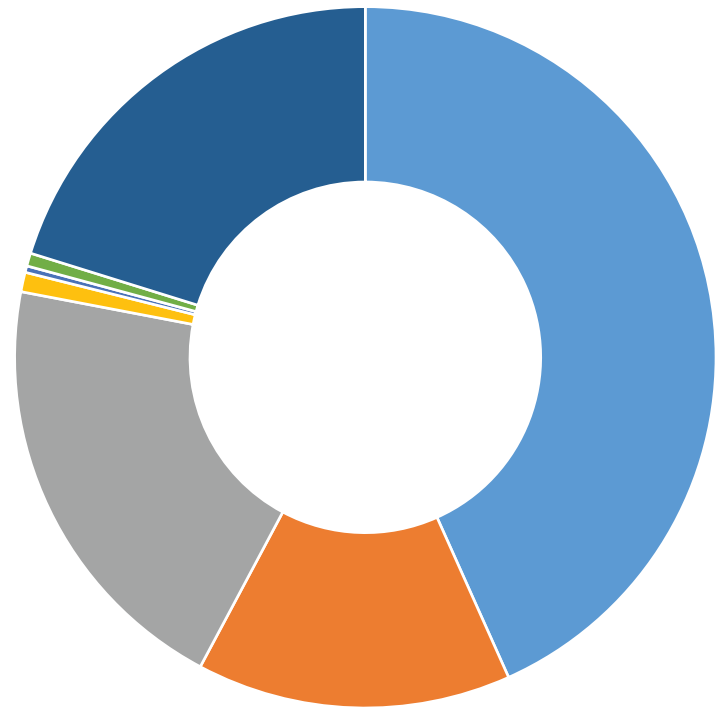

PARTICIPANT ETHNICITY

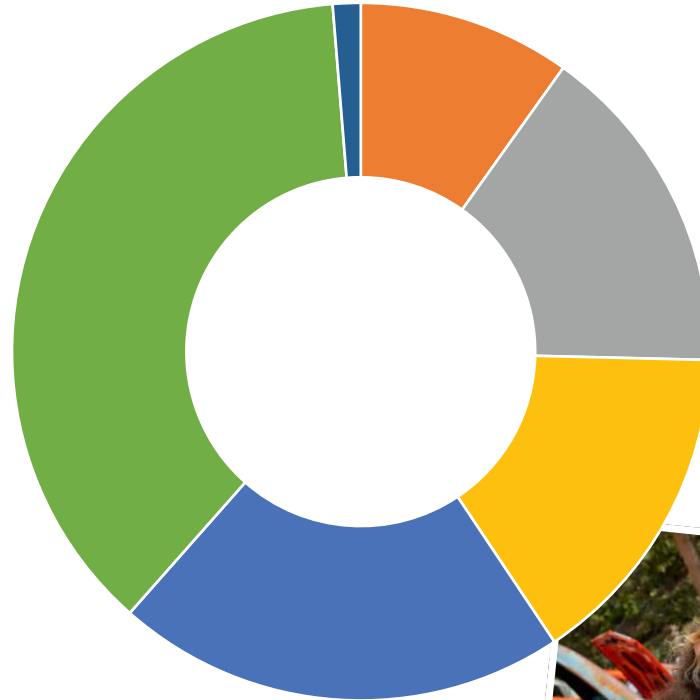

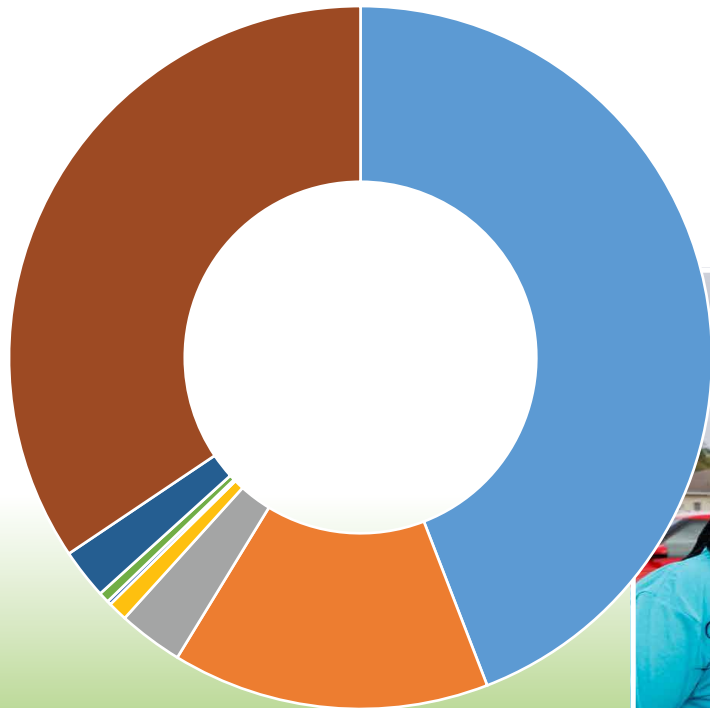

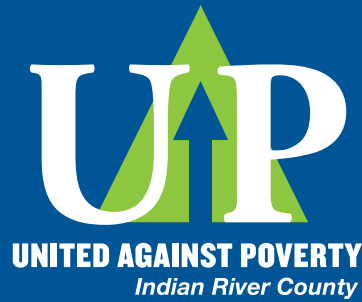
