Dear Supporters,

United Against Poverty (UP) St. Lucie holds a unique position within the community, delivering programs and services to help move individuals and families to economic self-sufficiency. We are so proud of the work we have done in 2023. The growth and support of our programs allowed a record number of people to gain employment, access low-cost groceries and receive crisis care services. I'm happy to share the many ways your support and investment helped those in the community we serve.

One of the most powerful tools for helping individuals rise up to economic self-sufficiency is through job training. We had a milestone year for our Success Training Employment Program (STEP). We helped 64 participants obtain job skills through the STEP program with 34 gaining employment to date thanks to our growing network of employer partners. The combined total income for our graduates equaled an impressive \$849K!

Many in our community faced struggles with food security due to the economy and rise in food costs. Our Member Share Grocery Program (MSGP) which serves families and individuals at/below the 200% poverty level was able to assist 11,835 unique members, providing them with access to healthy, nutritious food and household items. Members were able to retain \$4.6M in resources which allowed them to use those savings for other vital household expenses.

Our Life Enrichment Center (LEC) rose to meet the needs of our community. Our Crisis Stabilization team met with 309 unique households providing over 2,400 different services including housing or utility assistance, emergency food, health education, and one-time referrals to get the assistance needed. We continue to assist individuals in applying for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) through our partnership with the Florida Department of Children and Families (DCF) through their on-site office at UP St. Lucie.

On behalf of the entire UP St. Lucie team, we thank you for your support and the impact of your investment. None of what we do would be possible without our network of individual donors, foundations, community advocates and volunteers who stepped UP and provided their time, talent, and treasure. We thank you for your dedication and commitment to our community. Our mission would not be possible without YOU!

MEMBER SHARE GROCERY PROGRAM

United Against Poverty's Member Share Grocery Program is an accessible, dignified, worry-free food assistance program where you can personally select food and household products suited toward you and your family's needs.

Membership is free and available to households that fall at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level. Members contribute a small handling fee per item to help offset fuel, freight, warehouse, and overhead costs, which allows the MSGP to be self-sustainable. This meaningful exchange is part of our Hand-Up model that is designed to restore dignity and teach empowerment rather than entitlement.

Members can save up to two-thirds on their average grocery and household product purchase.

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2023 POVERTY GUIDELINES

48 Contiguous States (all except Alaska and Hawaii)

Qualified families at or below the 200% poverty level must fill out an application. Upon qualification, individuals become members and can begin to utilize the program.

2	\$39,440

For households with more than 4 people, add \$10,280 for each additional person.

SUCCESS TRAINING EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

STEP is a three-phase adult workforce training program designed to help individuals overcome barriers to employment.

STEP is made up of 85 hours of in-class coursework in the areas of emotional intelligence, workplace skill development and job acquisition training. Participants are supported in a group setting where they learn the hard and soft skills that make them desirable to employers.

Participants meet with a Workforce Development Specialist who focuses on creating individualized career plans, interview preparation and connections to employment opportunities that align with their desired career path.

Once participants have obtained employment, they are paired with a personal Success Coach. Together, they develop a Success Plan to ensure they excel in their current position and become strong candidates for future career advancement opportunities.










EVENT HIGHLIGHTS


