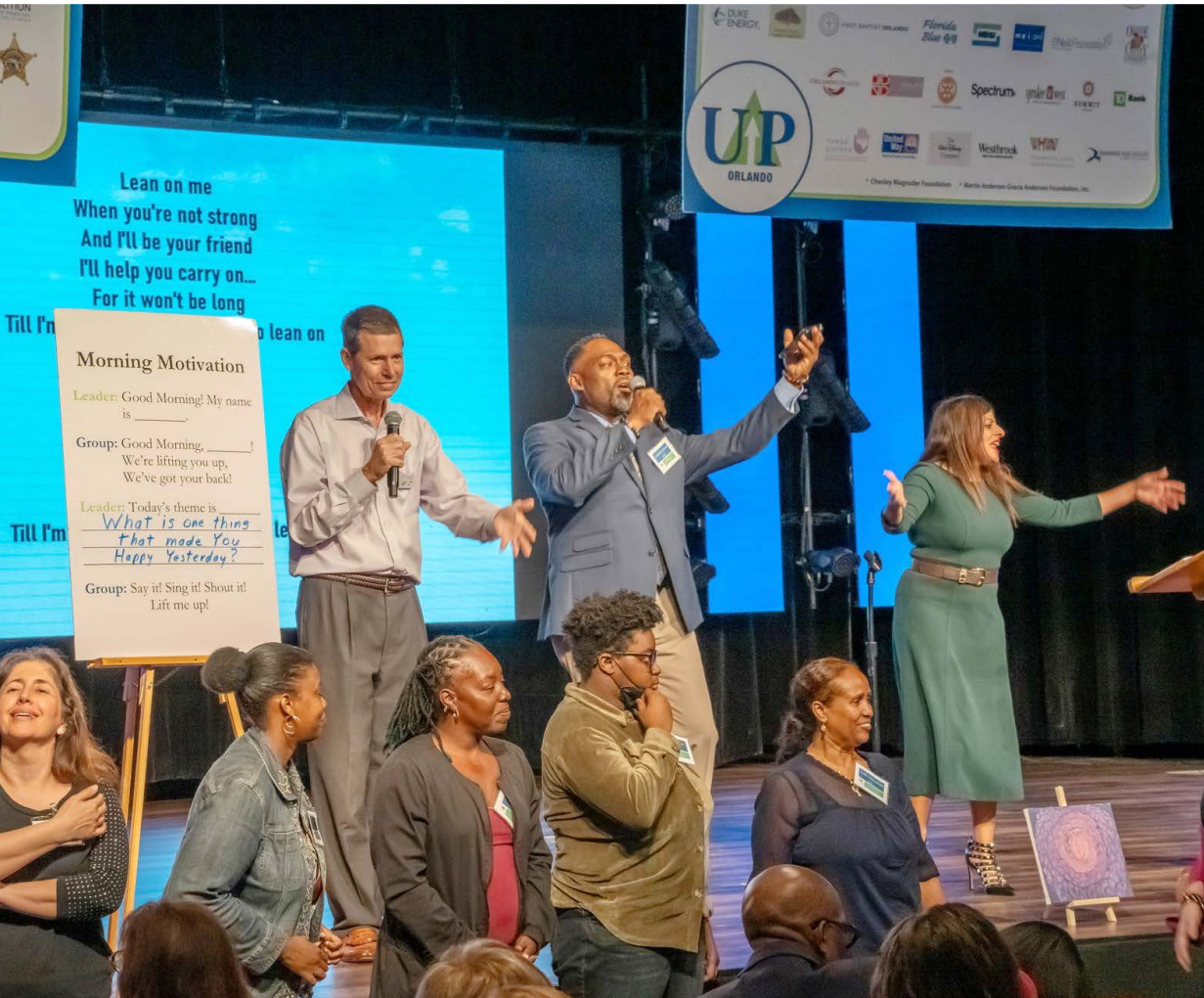


2023 ANNUAL REPORT

Hunger can affect people from all walks of life. Many people are one job loss or medical crisis away from food insecurity. To combat food insecurity, our Member Share Grocery Program served over 34,000 members who saved a remarkable \$17.6 million that they could redirect towards other life essentials. We know that food insecurity can often lead to health issues so that is why we place an importance on providing fresh, nutritious food and household products. Our grocery program allows members to personally select items and they can visit our centers as often as needed. Your support has made a profound impact on these individuals and families, helping them navigate challenging circumstances and strive towards a healthier future.

Our Success Training Employment Program (STEP), our workforce education program graduated 258 participants and assisted 157 in securing employment. Think of the impact this program has had on individuals and families. Providing a reliable stream of income can mean stable housing and the ability to serve a hot meal. It is children seeing their parent become empowered and confident. Our team of Success Coaches work with each participant for up to three years, guiding them towards career development and financial stability, helping ensure they continue on a path to economic self-sufficiency.

STEP participants have access to a network of over 300 employment partners across multiple industries. During 2023, we saw a record number of individuals successfully lift themselves to economic self-sufficiency. With our tried-and-true employment program and your support, we can continue to replicate these successful outcomes.

In 2023, your generous support was crucial in restoring dignity to households across Central Florida and the Treasure Coast. Individuals facing crisis situations sought assistance at our Life Enrichment Centers, where our Crisis Navigators delivered over 18,000 essential services to 2,725 unique households. These resources include assistance with utilities, housing, emergency food, education, counseling, health and much more. Our approach focuses on delivering comprehensive wraparound services tailored to each individual's unique needs. We work side by side with each individual throughout their journey empowering them, facilitating their path to success, and offering guidance and support.

Throughout the year, we celebrated several meaningful milestones including our 20th Anniversary. Our hardworking volunteers dedicated a total of 86,719 hours of time and talent, which kept operating costs down and allowed us to achieve an annual fund administrative cost rate of a low 9.1%. At our Orlando campus, we successfully completed the installation of brand-new freezers and coolers which offer access to a wider variety of products. In St. Lucie, we hosted our 1st annual Hand UP Luncheon where members of the community came together to raise money for our programs and services. And, in Indian River, we continue to host numerous career and community resource fairs bringing hundreds of members in the community together with the purpose of lifting lives!

None of these accomplishments would have been possible without the support of our network of donors, organizations, foundations, community advocates and volunteers who stepped UP and chose to invest in improving their communities by supporting our programs and our mission. Thank you for sharing our vision and lifting the lives of those in the communities we live in. We are going UP!



MEMBER SHARE GROCERY PROGRAM

United Against Poverty's Member Share Grocery Program is an accessible, dignified, worry-free food assistance program where you can personally select food and household products suited toward you and your family's needs.

Membership is free and available to households that fall at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level. Members contribute a small handling fee per item to help offset fuel, freight, warehouse, and overhead costs, which allows the MSGP to be self-sustainable. This meaningful exchange is part of our Hand-Up model that is designed to restore dignity and teach empowerment rather than entitlement.

Qualified **families at or below the 200% poverty level** must fill out an application. Upon qualification, individuals become members and can begin to utilize the program.

SUCCESS TRAINING EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

STEP is a three-phase adult workforce training program designed to help individuals overcome barriers to employment.

STEP is made up of 85 hours of in-class coursework in the areas of emotional intelligence, workplace skill development and job acquisition training. Participants are supported in a group setting where they learn the hard and soft skills that make them desirable to employers.

Participants meet with a Workforce Development Specialist who focuses on creating individualized career plans, interview preparation and connections to employment opportunities that align with their desired career path.

Once participants have obtained employment, they are paired with a personal Success Coach. Together, they develop a Success Plan to ensure they excel in their current position and become strong candidates for future career advancement opportunities.

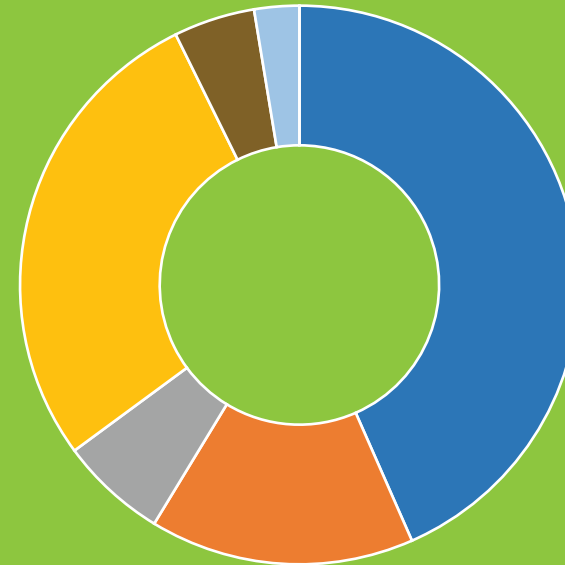

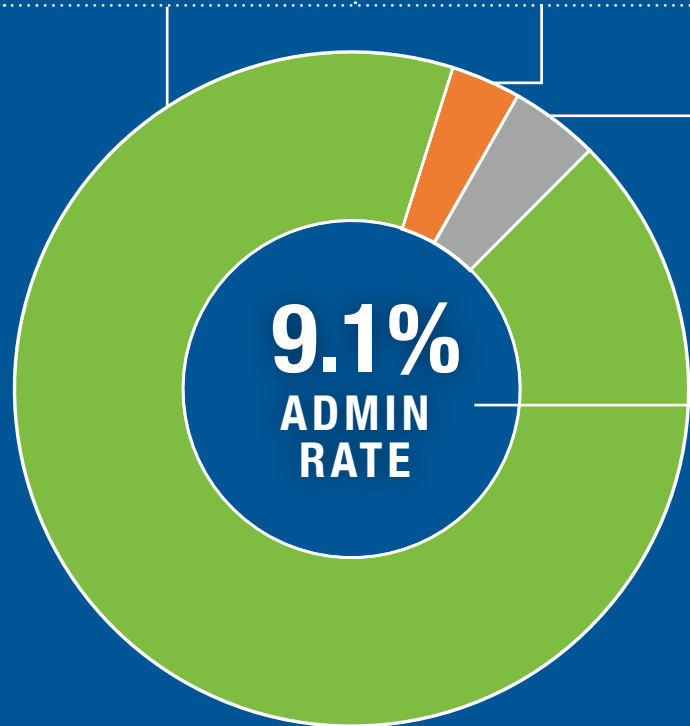

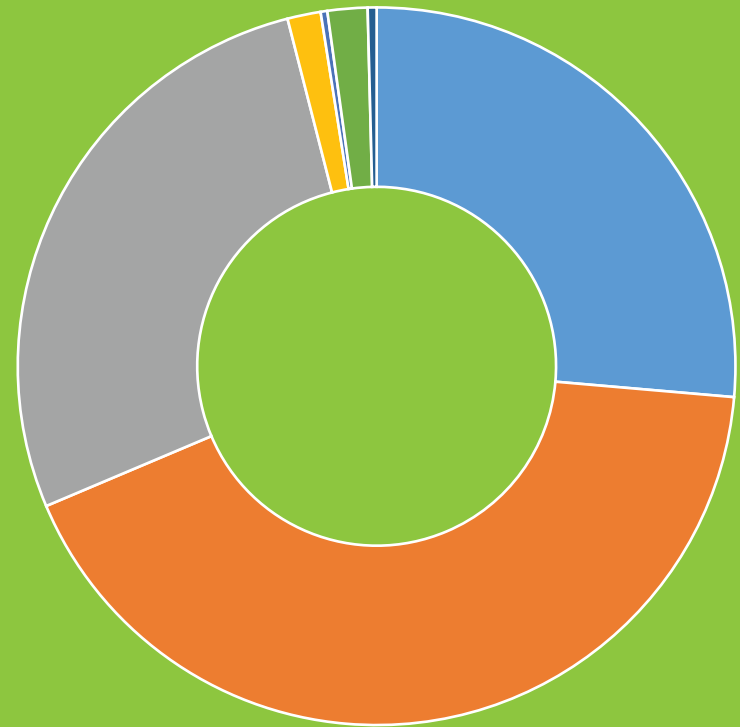

PARTICIPANT ETHNICITY

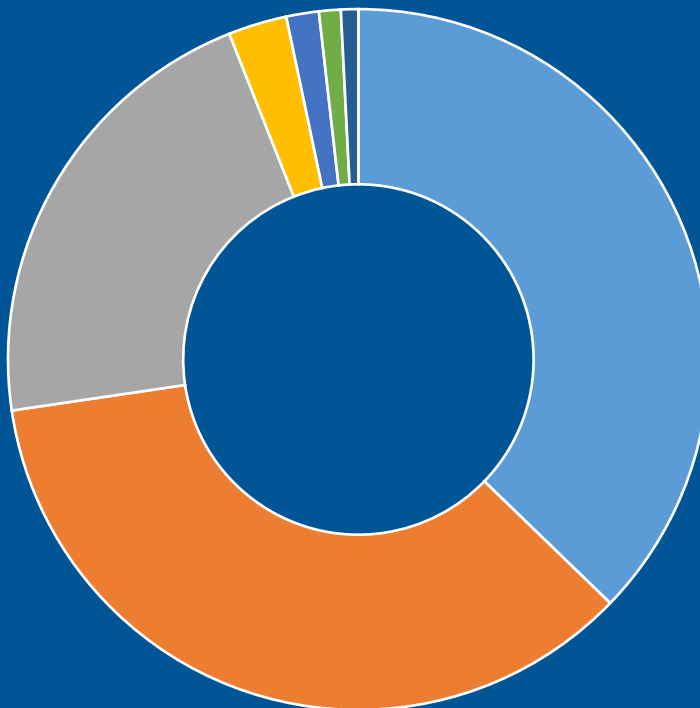

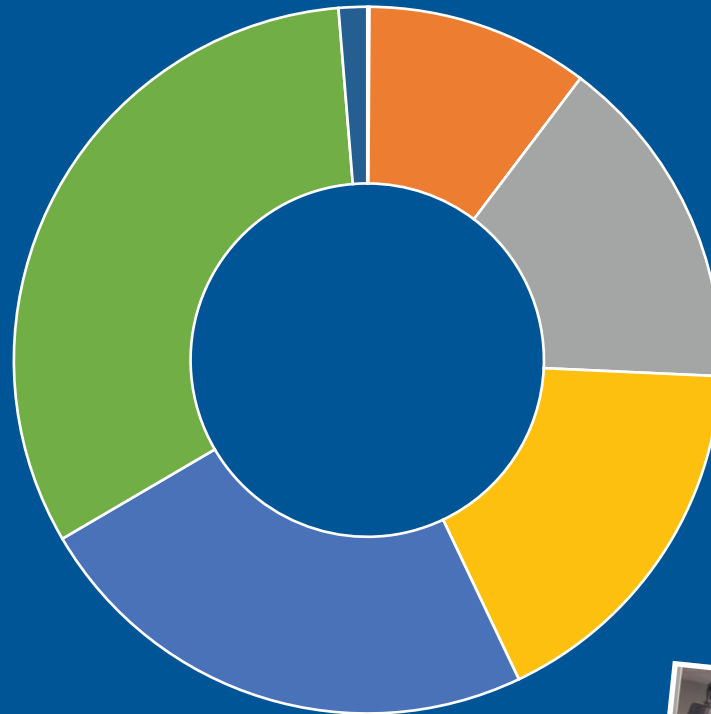
